### IDA's Partner UH College of Medicine Update A Carnegie-designated Tier One public research

university Despite the challenges of 2020, the UH College of Medicine has had several successes -- We have an extraordinary inaugural class, that is strongly mission-driven and diverse; we added 13 talented new faculty members and we received external funding from the National Institutes of Health, Humana Corporation and regional foundations for interdisciplinary research studies that will improve health in our communities and make a difference in patients' lives.

In addition, we partnered on several important projects with local community organizations and agencies, involving our students, staff, and faculty. In June, our College hosted a food and toiletry distribution in Third Ward with the American Heart Association, Riverside United Methodist Church, and Humana. We delivered 117 boxes of fresh produce and toiletries to residents of Cuney Homes and Royal Palms Apartments. On October 30, the College co-hosted a Trunk-or-Treat drive-through community event for the distribution of food, toiletries and Halloween treats at the Tejano Center for Community Concerns/Raul Yzaguirre School for Success in the East End. We served 563 adults and 488 children.

Next year we plan to continue building on our successes as we move forward in building our College.

### Meet Dean Spann



Stephen J. Spann, M.D., M.B.A.

Stephen J. Spann, a family physician leader, educator and researcher, is currently Founding Dean of the new College of Medicine and Vice-President for Medical Affairs at the University of Houston. Dr. Spann has dedicated his career to improving health and health care around the world by training future health care professionals, contributing to the scientific knowledge base of primary care, leading medical school faculty, physician medical groups and hospital medical staffs, and striving to practice excellent, evidence-based family medicine.

Spann has been active in the Dr. development of the specialty of Family Medicine both in the United States and abroad. He has served as a member of the Commission on Public Health and Scientific Affairs, the Task Force on Clinical Policies, and as member and chair the Commission on Clinical Policies and Research and the Task Force to Enhance Family Practice Research, of the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP). He served as a member of Task Force 1, and chaired Task Force 6 of the Future of Family Medicine Project, focusing on the development of the New Model of Family Medicine practice, now known as the Patient Centered Medical Home, and the development of financial models to predict its success. He served as the lead consultant to the AAFP planning process to develop a national practice resource center to support the implementation of the New Model, resulting in the development of Transformed, a subsidiary of the AAFP. He has served as a consultant to medical schools, residency programs, ministries of health, and health care delivery systems in many countries, focusing on primary care training programs and clinical practice development and implementation.

Dr. Spann served as Chief Medical Officer of Tawam Hospital, a 460 bed tertiary care teaching facility in Al Ain, United Arab Emirates, which is managed by Johns Hopkins Medicine International, and as senior advisor on primary care and academic affairs to SEHA, the Abu Dhabi Health Services Company, from December 2012 through May 2015. Previously, he served as Professor and Chairman of the Department of Family and Community Medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, Texas from April 1997 to November 2012.

He served as Senior Vice-President and Dean of Clinical Affairs of that institution from November 2008 through September 2012. He was previously Professor and Chairman of the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston, Texas (1990-1997), a member of the faculty and Vice-Chairman of the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine (1982-1990), and a member of the voluntary clinical teaching faculty of the Department of Family Medicine, Wake Forest Bowman Gray School of Medicine (1979-1982). Prior to entering full-time academic medicine, Dr. Spann spent four years practicing rural family medicine in Arkansas and North Carolina.

A graduate of Baylor University and Baylor College of Medicine, Dr. Spann completed his residency training in Family Medicine at Duke University Medical Center, and received the M.B.A. degree from the University of Texas at Dallas. He and his wife Nancy have two married children and five grandchildren, who live in Texas.

Faculty Position at UH College of Medicine Longitudinal Primary Care Course Exclusive to Indian Doctors Association Members

#### **To: Members of the Indian Doctors Association - Greater Houston**

The University of Houston College of Medicine has the mission to improve the health and healthcare of the Greater Houston area, and other areas of Texas that face physician shortages, by educating a diverse group of physicians who will provide compassionate, high value care with a focus on primary care.

One of the ways in which we plan to meet this mission is to place medical students with experienced Primary Care Physicians in the Greater Houston area in our Longitudinal Primary Care (LPC) Course. In LPC, each student will spend one half-day per week in the office of a Family Physician, General Internist or General Pediatrician. The goal of this program is both to improve the student's clinical skills and to provide exposure and mentorship in the field of Primary Care practice by experienced practicing physicians.

In order to meet this goal, The UH College of Medicine is recruiting Primary Care Physicians who would be willing to work with students on their LPC course. The attending preceptor would be responsible for the supervision of the student, would provide evaluation and feedback, and would serve as a professional role model/mentor. Students would start by shadowing/ observing the physician but would then have required patient care experiences to perform which, in general, would require that the student sees one or two patients in a half-day.

Physicians who participate in this will be appointed as a Voluntary Faculty of the UH College of Medicine. This will provide, among other things, access to the University of Houston on-line library, including free access to Up To Date. Family Physicians who are certified by the ABFM may use this experience to meet their Part IV Maintenance of Certification requirement. The UH College of Medicine will also provide faculty development and CME activities throughout the year. We will look for other opportunities to work with our Volunteer Faculty in ways that would be of benefit to the Faculty and would be open to suggestions from you on ideas that you may have.
